Term 3 Learning in Year 5

This term our topic is 'Peasants, Princes and Pestilence. In this topic, we will be exploring the dark and deadly world of 14th century Britain, closely focusing on the Black Death. There will be opportunities to study sources, read and write historical accounts, as well as discovering the grim effects of bugs and bacteria on the human body!

Mathematics

We will be starting the term by working on area and perimeter. This will then be followed by practising formal multiplication and division strategies. We will then apply these newly-learnt skills to tackling real life word problems.

How you can help your child

- Look for opportunities to talk about maths in the everyday environment.
- Encourage children to explain the key maths vocabulary they have learnt during that week.
- Support with any maths homework.
- Support with learning the multiplication tables that they are working on in class (up to 12 x).
- When possible, allow your child to access Times Table Rockstars to aid their times table recall.

English

The book we are studying this term is 'Children of Winter' by Berlie Doherty. We will be continuing our 'VIPERS' reading comprehension alongside our class text and a wider range of non-fiction too. Please continue to help your child by looking at the key reading skills, and encouraging them to infer, predict and summarise from a text where possible. We will begin with diary entries, looking at first-hand accounts of what life was like during the 14th century. Afterwards the children will be writing formal and informal letters, before finishing the term by creating their own medieval stories.

How you can help your child

- Make sure your child reads daily. Don't forget to record reading sessions in the Reading Record booklets, especially on a **Wednesday** evening.
- Discuss meanings of any new vocabulary they come across.
- Support with any English homework and spellings that they are working on in class.

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Lock your doors and pull up the drawbridge: the dreaded 'Great Pestilence' is here.

At the start of this half term, we'll meet a strange character and use a range of source materials to research the symptoms of the Black Death. Our geography skills will help us understand how the black death came to Britain and why it spread so quickly. We'll investigate the effects of bacteria on the human body and find out about disgusting and dangerous plague 'cures'. Our personal plague journals will record the horror of the black death and we'll write poetry inspired by Geoffrey Chaucer. We'll learn about the 'dance of death' and perform dances inspired by Saint-Saen's Danse Macabre. We'll learn about different social classes, understand the reasons for the Peasants' Revolt, take part in a mock battle and learn what it was like to be a knight.

At the end of the ILP, we'll find out about the Black Death through history and make a timeline of outbreaks around the world. Observing live domestic rats will help us to learn about their characteristics and life cycles. A medieval tournament will also be held to showcase our knowledge of medieval knights and demonstrate our jousting skills.
