Differentiation:

Developing Questions to support the use of -ly adverbs in a single clause sentence using words that are phonetically decodable with some taken from the Year 1 spelling list.

Expected Questions to support the use of -ly adverbs, including words that are an exception to the rule. Using sentences with expanded noun phrases, most words phonetically decodable with some taken from the Year 1 and Year 2 spelling lists.

Greater Depth Questions to support the use of -ly and -ily adverbs including words that are an exception to the rule. Using multi clause sentences, some words cannot be easily decodable.
